

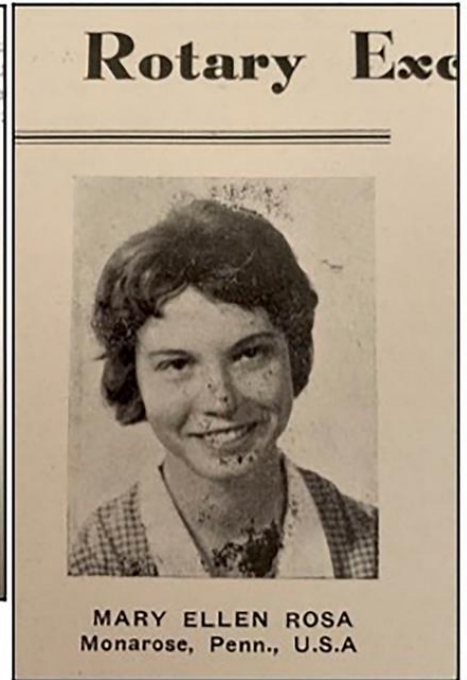

There is a lot more to Dr Brian Greed than his dental history. He was a very keen Marlin fishing expert and Liz Tallis tells the story which you may have heard before, how Brian would bring back his prize Marlin catch and leave it at the back of the surgery where he proceeded to make a fibreglass model of it.

Always an inventor, he built his own plane, made his own rifle and recently he finished building an organ. In 1995 Brian was awarded the prestigious Medal of the Order of Australia.

On Thursday evening we celebrated Brian's time in the Rotary Club of Benalla. Brian joined Rotary in 1957 and has been in Rotary for almost 68 years.(May 2025) Brian was president in 1964/65. At that stage the club was a similar size to today with 50 members. In those days attendance was carefully monitored and almost half of his club, 22 members, had 90% to 100% weekly attendance, making up a missed attendance by visiting other clubs. It was a pretty active club.

Brian has held just about every role in the club possible. 74/75 he was on Membership, 75/76 Rural and Urban committee and chair of that committee. He has been on Club History, Peer Support, Classification, Cashier, Portsea Camp programs, Bulletin, Rotary information, Environment, Music and Vocation. And then there was Friendship Exchange where he was chair and subsequently lead a group study exchange in 2003 /2004.

In 1988 Brian was awarded a PHF.



Portfolios since 2005/06 include Rotary Information, Friendship Exchange, Career Development, Public Relations, Music, School Debating, Disaster Relief, Bald Archy, Youth Service for six consecutive years, Family of Rotary and Rotary Foundation.

And that's just naming a few!!!

Some years ago, Rotary supported a giant clearing sale at Brian and June Greed's farm on Samaria Road. Over \$9000 was raised. As a result the Dr Brian Greed Science Scholarship was introduced (2014) with the first recipients being Sam Schneider and Thomas Jackson.

In the last few years Brian has been our resident photographer recording all our guest speakers.

Brian we salute you and thank you so much for your 68 years of dedicated service to the Rotary Club of Benalla.

Four clubs join the community in cleaning up the Merri Creek



Rotarians are people of action, and we thrive when working alongside the community to create positive and lasting change. Dedication to service was on full display during Clean Up Australia Day on March 2, as volunteers braved the overcast skies and occasional showers to make a tangible impact on the local environment by cleaning up the Merri Creek in Coburg.

A passionate group of Rotarians and community members gathered in Coburg with a shared goal: to remove waste, protect the ecosystem, and contribute to a healthier, cleaner environment. The event was expertly organised by Helena Kelada of The Merri Paddle for a Platypus Future, a group dedicated to restoring the platypus population in Merri Creek by improving water quality and habitat conditions. This initiative was further supported by Friends of Merri Creek, four Rotary Clubs—Coburg, Moreland, Pascoe Vale, and Preston—and local residents who care deeply about conservation.

In just over an hour, the team collected an astonishing volume of rubbish, including plastic waste, discarded household items, an office chair, and even a decayed mattress. While cleanup efforts are crucial, they also serve as a stark reminder of the broader pollution issues affecting our waterways.

Rotary remains committed to environmental stewardship and will continue to take action to protect our natural spaces for future generations.



Sunbury Rotary Walks for Mental Health



On Saturday, 1st March 2025, the Rotary Club of Sunbury successfully launched its inaugural fundraising walk to support Australian Rotary Health's "Lift the Lid" Mental Health awareness campaign. Approximately 50 community members participated in the event at Rotary Park, traversing 1.5 or 2.0 km routes around Clarke Oval and Blind Creek walking tracks.

Club President John Webster expressed pride in the achievement, raising \$4000 on a beautiful autumn morning. The event specifically focused on research into young people's mental health in families experiencing domestic violence.



"Our Club is very happy with the result, and this will be the first of many such events," John said. He extended gratitude to sponsors and the Sunbury community for their generous support.

The Rotary Club of Sunbury, celebrating its 52nd anniversary on 12th April, remains deeply committed to community engagement and mental health awareness.

Myrtleford Rotary: Youth Exchange pioneers

In 1959, a significant milestone in international youth exchanges was marked when Peter Barnett from the Rotary Club of Myrtleford, Victoria, Australia, and the Rotary Club of Scottsbluff, Nebraska, USA, came together to establish the first youth exchange program.

After a trip to Europe in 1949, and learning about other religions and cultures while making friends with villagers as he travelled, Mr Barnett became committed to the idea of furthering understanding of the world and goodwill through the power of person-to-person exchange. This pivotal moment not only laid the foundation for fostering cultural understanding and global connections but also set the stage for a legacy that has spanned over six decades. In 1971, Mr Barnett was presented with a Paul Harris Fellowship and named 'Father of Youth Exchange'.

The first students to experience this new opportunity were John Rogers, who came to Australia for the year and Marjorie Price, who ventured across to the USA. Marking fifty years since the first exchange, Riley Smith (Scottsbluff) and Natalie O'Callaghan (Myrtleford) also experienced the wonders of the year long exchange.

Since the first exchange, the Rotary Club of Myrtleford has sponsored 33 outgoing students and hosted 34 students. Many of these students have formed lasting bonds with the families they became a part of and the friends they made.

Ask any past participant of the Rotary Youth Exchange program, and they'll probably have a twinkle in their eye as they recount their adventures. From navigating foreign languages to forming bonds that transcend borders, the program has a way of changing lives in ways you never thought possible. It's not just about seeing the world; it's about discovering yourself and your place in it.

The Rotary Club of Preston warmly invite you to contribute to our appeal to support Remy, to give her hope for a future that can be promising and fulfilling.

'Remy''* (name changed for privacy) is a young Palestinian woman who sustained critical injuries from an accident as a young child. She is now 20 years old.

The Rotary Club of Preston befriended Remy and her mother when the Australian charity, **Children First Foundation** brought her to Melbourne for complex surgery when she was 6 years old. She recovered well, and returned to her home in Gaza. She has endured multiple Surgeries since that time, and successfully completed her schooling achieving excellent academic results.

Remy and some members of her family managed to flee Gaza after months of living in a war zone. Many family and friends were killed, and their home was destroyed. In early 2024 they sought refuge in Australia, and have been granted a Visa on humanitarian grounds.

NOW.... Remy is undergoing intense medical care in a Melbourne hospital. She is being supported by the love of her mother and a sister.

As the family are from interstate, accommodation and cost of living expenses are mounting up. She will need significant ongoing medical care.

Remy's hope is to begin Tertiary studies in 2nd Semester this year

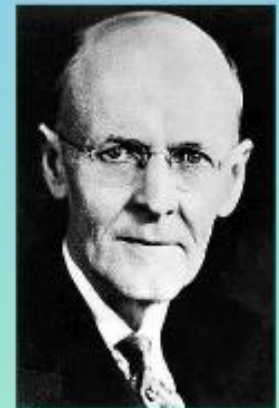

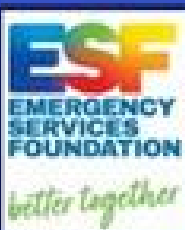

Phillipa Huynh, an Australian Rotary Health PhD Candidate, is conducting a study on The Risk and Protective Factors for Complex Trauma in Australian Rural and Urban Men.

Phillipa reports, "..Traumatic events can have a significant impact on someone's well-being and quality of life. By identifying what helps or harms men's mental health, the study could lead to better support and interventions for men dealing with the long-term impacts of traumatic experiences.

This research is especially important as men in rural Australia face higher suicide rates than those in cities. Understanding the unique challenges and strengths of men in both urban and rural areas could provide valuable insights for improving mental health care and reducing suicide rates in the community.
