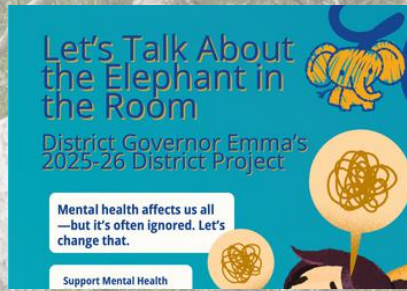
As we round out the month of February, the District and local teams supporting the fire affected areas continue to work well. I'm thankful we have disaster response experience and dedicated people of action at this difficult time of the fires. You will have seen the Tankful of Hope campaign of 16 x 10,000L water tanks initially supported by Mooroopna, Moreland, Mount Beauty and Shepparton South. This continues with pace with a further six tanks arriving soon with the support of many other generous individuals and clubs, both in and out of our District. In addition to the water project, we have now delivered the compressor for agricultural equipment and fencing support, with Tallangatta. We have made some of our payments to the back to school program, supporting approximately 45 Primary and Secondary school students in the Alexandra and Yea area who have either lost their homes and or cannot return home yet. This project provides some financial support to the families to ensure these students receive the start they need to the school year and a partnership with the school Principals. We also have 30 x \$500 RAWCS funded debit cards in use in Alexandra, Euroa, Highlands (by Shep South) and Yea. The final open item is the counselling services by Ivan Lister, who also assisted in the recent drought program. 20 days of Ivan's time is funded by a generous donor and topped up by RAWCS funds.

## DG's Column (continued)

Thank you to our other clubs and generous individual donors also from Beechworth, Belvoir Wodonga, Broadmeadows, Coburg, Corowa, e-club of Change Makers, Ivanhoe, Pascoe Vale, Preston, Sunbury, Tatura and a rebound youth exchange family. We have recently received notice of RI Disaster grant for fires to the value of US\$25K (second for the year with one July – October 2026 for drought support). With a return to the service roadshow after the Christmas break I enjoyed the Corowa Tim Fischer Orientation Dinner and festival set up. The Friday evening room was full of members and support from the community. The following morning, the team gathered for the market and festival set up. We worked quickly to add bunting fences, distribute assets in the precincts and set up a misting tent for the heat, before meeting in the IGA café for the most important task – coffee and chats.

The Yarrawonga Mulwala Australia day breakfast awards was another strong community event, with many locals in attendance. An early start and creative planning to ensure many were in the shade, the locals and some visitors, enjoyed the community awards and breakfast.

Zone catch ups continue as a class with several meeting updates this month about the pilot extension for a further two years (June 2028).The Regional Council share updates regularly and I encourage you to discuss with your RCL for any questions.

In addition to the pilot, there is a re-districting taskforce which is led by Director Jennifer, Steering Group chair Ingrid, Regional Council chair Jennie, RISPPPO staff Andrew and from the DG's Kirsten Hawke D9920 NZ and Pacific Islands and Mark Williams D9620 Aus (Queensland) and PNG; from the DGEs Brent Gerrard D9940 NZ and Paul Miegel D9790 Aus (NSW and VIC); and from DGNs Damian Leach D9510 Aus (SA, N.T, Vic, NSW and QLD) and Murray Wilson D9815 Aus (Vic). This team will work hard to explore the best outcomes for the future of our Zone which will be far less than the current 19 Districts, and mean we as a District will encompass more members, clubs, and additional parts of our current states. Paul will keep you informed as information arises, which will be in line with a June 2026 RI board meeting, for enactment by July 2028.

I really enjoy these days with our students, from the awards presentations, to the "my favourite pin" speeches and the debrief chats.

A quick drive over to the border and I went along to Beats and Eats with Albury Hume. It was a hot evening and was happy to help out with some bar service. The park was full, with local community enjoying the food, fun and music. The following morning I headed out to the Bellbridge Lake Hume and Albury North Cycling challenge where these two clubs support the cyclists, from small children to athletes. On race completion, the cold drinks and sausages were well received and good family and community environment was enjoyed by all.



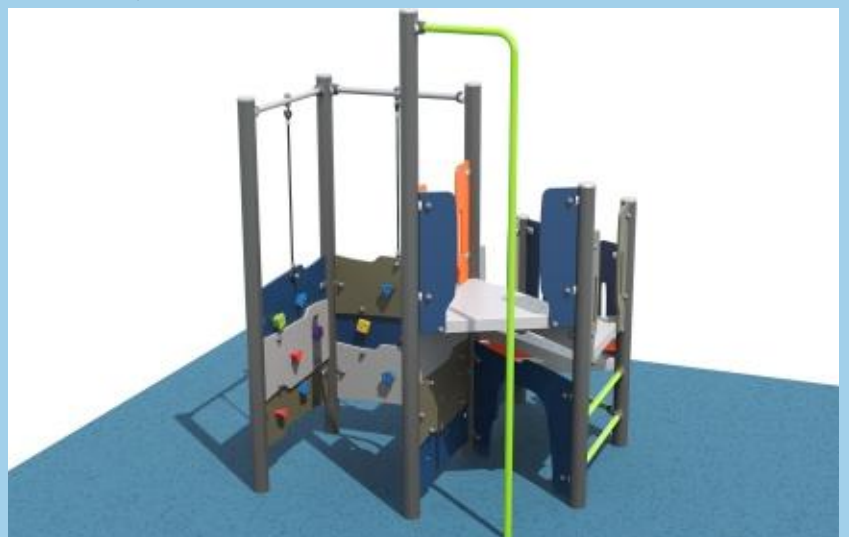
### Travel Escape Club supports its FIRST International initiative through Hive RC's Period Project

## Attracting new members through care and service

There's nothing like a natural disaster to pinpoint the clubs which look after their members and dive into service projects whether their own towns are involved or not. The public cannot help but be impressed and attracted to volunteer their time with a view to becoming a member in the future.

The recent Longwood – Ruffy bushfires hit in January and within minutes of evacuation, members were ringing other members to check on their welfare. Phonecalls came in from other clubs and Districts and one club formed a phone tree to ensure that someone rang every one of their members. The information gleaned was then put into an email and shared by the secretary, so that everyone was kept up to date.

Clubs went into Service mode. You could find clubs joining together to feed the firies or truckies delivering hay to affected areas, manning the Emergency Relief Centres and setting up depots for distribution of vouchers for a range of items. Funds from clubs were donated immediately to ensure tools, food and drinking water got to where it was needed. BlazeAid is in action and attracting the help of members and volunteers as well as Upper Goulburn Landcare Network where a Rotary team are on site right now.

Those clubs outside the affected areas have made financial donations as well as sending members wishing to volunteer. Some are already planning fundraising events.

I heard of one club where family were hauled in to help and the wife told us 'as I watched the trucks loaded with hay arriving in Yea, tears poured down my face and I knew I had to join Rotary and be part of a club that cares so much about other people'.

The trick to gaining more members from all these efforts is to make sure they are well documented and there are photos to back it up. Then the media needs to hear about it – think radio, local newspapers, social media and websites. Don't be shy – this is an opportunity to attract like-minded people to join your club and become part of this amazing organisation we call Rotary.

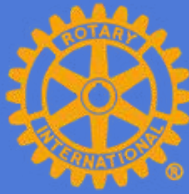
